


### Plant-O-Rama Sale at Sherman Gardens

### **Garden Tools**

Climing in and around the trees, needless to say, I got pretty sticky. I started out with a hat-but it didn't last long in and amoung the branches. Plumeria latex, while not techincally toxic, is a considerable irritant. Shampoo was little help unmatting my hair, but conditioner did the trick.

As one who tries prevention first, I recommend a shower cap as one of your pruning tools!

### SUSTAINABLE HORTICULTURE-**Peat-Free Planting**

International Peat Society:



Peat is accumulated decaying material, typically Sphagnum moss, which is compressed and decayed by accumulating weight over hundreds of years. It is the single biggest carbon sink on the earth, and is practically not renewable. Bogs, in which peat grows, hold approximately 10% of the world's fresh water and are rich and unique habitats. Historically, Peat has been an important resource fuel for heating and cooking. Harvesting peat involves draining the bog and cutting the peat which results in release of CO2 and destroys habitat. Much of the peat available in the United States is sourced from Canada.

The UK and Europe have banned or are fading out the use of peat in home gardening in lieu of more sustainable potting materials. While home gardening use of peat is not banned in the United States, decreasing its use is a step toward sustainable gardening and cutting greenhouse gas emissions.

### Pros of peat moss for the garden

- Absorbs and retains water
- Prevents soil compaction
- Holds soil nutrients
- Fee of bacteria, fungi, and weed seeds
- Lasts several years
- Perfect for acid-loving plants.

### Cons of peat moss for the garden

- Non-renewable resource
- Contributes to climate change, water and habitat
- Expensive
- Poor in nutrients
- Too acidic for some plants
- May diminish helpful bacteria and organisms

Alternatives to peat are not a one-to-one replacement. It may take some trial and error to formulate just the right "recipe" for your use and micro-climate. Common replacements include:

- Cedar mulch- finely ground tree bark- a by-product of the lumber industry. It is generally cheaper than peat. Be sure, however, the mulch is fine enough for your intended use.
- Coco Coir- shredded by-product of the coconut industry. Most commonly sourced from Sri Lankawhich adds transportation greenhouse gas emissions. Coir is low in nutrients itself, but will hold added nutrients effectively to make them available when plants need them. Lower quality coir may have a higher salt content.
- Home-grown or commercial compost. Compost can be locally source in most areas. The content, however, can be variable leading to unpredictable results. Purchasing in a large volume and working with it over time may provides more reliable results.
- Worm Castings- while a great for use in small patio plantings, worm casting can be expensive for tree plantings, except as a supplement.






